You can always practice on a junker at the wrecking yard first though just to get 'the feel' for it first. They come off pretty easily though. Just go slow and easy and everything'll be fine.'

"I used a thin putty knife to pry them off. They are a press fit, no special tools needed.'



# **Restored vs. Refurbished**

Now lest you get all giddy about a passle of "new" old 240's, ponder for a moment the following words from Z-car aficionado Carl Beck:

"I am forced to say - and please pass this along to any friends or Dealers - I'll be more than glad to argue the point with anyone.

Restored vs. Refurbished: If you are willing to buy or have your car "Refurbished"...then making switches of engines/transmissions etc. is fine - but the car will not be resalable for anything close to the \$20K to \$25K the Dealers are talking about....I doubt that many would/could be sold for that kind of money.

# **Clutch Collar Redux**

I know we've covered this before, but just so we don't all forget, Kyle Hagemann (kyle@sonic.net) wrote the following to the 240 list:

"Add to the list of differences between the L24 and L28 the fact that the pressure plate for the L28 flywheel is shorter than the L24. I put in a ZX five speed a while back, and recently added an L28. When I put the five speed in, I retained the four speed TO bearing, because it's the correct one for the L24/Four Speed clutch pack. When I put the L28 and L28 Clutch in, I neglected to change to the longer TO bearing. Oopsie! I tried to adjust the difference, but the geometry of the clutch fork was such that it slipped or was impossible to get into gear. I changed the bearing (I saved the L28 TO IF YOU ARE THINKING -"RESTORED" I could not recommend that anyone BUY a "refurbished" 240Z and pay \$20K to \$25K for a "non-matching numbers car"...don't care who does the work! That's not a restoration worth investing in. You can buy all kinds of really nice street cars or modified cars for far far less than that today!!!

It would be a very very bad waste of time and money - it will never be worth that on a resale or collectable basis. NISSAN should not do this!! Too bad if they have to spend some time and money looking for the right cars! There are plenty of them out there. (not for \$3K however -and so what)

bearing, but God only knows why!) and everything is Kosher. So, remember, boys and girls:

"L24 Flywheel/clutch = short T/O bearing L28 Flywheel/clutch = long T/O bearing

"I wish I'd know this earlier! It woulda saved R&R'ing the tranny. Oh well, live and learn!"

Very succinctly put, and easy to remember. But Kyle's post also points out a few of the problems in talking about mixing and matching clutches and trannys, and that has to do with the names of the parts. In any L series clutch changeout you have three "parts" to consider: the clutch (pressure plate together with friction disc); the throwout bearing; and the throwout bearing collar. It's arguable exactly what parts are "thicker" or "thinner." For example, I seem to rememFor that kind of money, it should be "correct"...not hodged together out of copped up parts cars... All Matching Numbers is where its at when it comes to investments or resale. If you like losing money - have at it.

NISSAN would be doing a great disservice to their Customers if they indeed took this path...Clearly - if the customer wants a modified car and they know what the down stream effects are on the value of that car - Then I have no problems with the Dealers doing whatever the customers want - I do have a problem with the Dealers "giving up on finding and restoring the good examples that are still out there, or presenting them to the public as restored Classics or Vintage Cars..."

ber that Marc Sayer said something about the "clutch pack" of one or the other being thicker, and that the throwout bearings are actually the same thickness. The important thing to remember is what Kyle points out: 240=short, and 280=long. You can usually avoid the whole problem by simply buying a clutch "kit" (pressure plate, disc, T/O bearing, and collar) for the transmission rather than focusing on the engine. Or, if you're into mnemonics: a 240 is short on cubic inches, and a 280 is long on cubic inches.

By the way, if you're replacing the clutch, did you know that Nissan Competition has a needle bearing replacement for the stock sleeve-type clutch pinion bearing? Doesn't cost much either. Available through your Datsun Dealer (oops, Nissan, Nissan).









# The Z Trivia Corner
